We have been residents of the Borden-Carleton area for most of our lives and during this time have used the services provided by both Howatt Tourist Mart and Cerettis Grocery & Hardware.

Personally – our family has purchased fuel, groceries and hardware in both locations at minimum of once a week.

In a broader sense - both family-operated businesses have supported Borden-Carleton and its surrounding communities for many years in the following manner:

- Sponsoring of individuals and local teams to participate locally, regionally and nationally in sporting activities;
- Contributing to community events and programs to meet the needs of citizens through donations of food or monies e.g. food bank, free skates at the local arena, Borden Days, Canada Day celebrations, etc.;
- Sponsoring awards and activities at the local schools (Kinkora High School and Amherst Cove Consolidated School);
- Hiring locals as employees;
- Supporting families and individuals in need (victims of poor health, fire, etc.);
- Encouraging local providers to sell their produce or other products in their businesses; and
- Engaging with members of the community by recognizing them by name and asking after their families.

(Please note – this list is not all inclusive, it is meant to highlight a few of the many contributions these businesses have made in the past or are currently making.)

The current proposal by D.P. Murphy will cause hardship and possibly closure for these longstanding family businesses. While there is some value in having greater access to “fast food” (in the form of a Tims and Wendys), our community does not need a fourth gas station nor an additional convenience store. We are well served by our current providers!
